Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

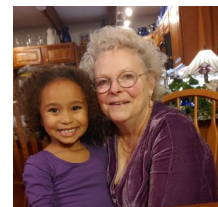

Paul says to the community at Philippi, "I can do all things through him who strengthens me." Jesus invites his followers "to believe in the light, so that you may become children of the light." I believe that we are all children of the light, cherished and loved unconditionally and unrelentingly by our Lord Jesus. And I believe that that divine and purifying love empowers and equips us to be the people in the world Jesus calls us to be, needs us to be, yearns for us to be. The question we really have to grapple with is, do we believe that we can "do all things through him who strengthens us"? I think sometimes we look around and see all the reasons God

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undoubtedly loves so many of the other people around us. And yet, because we know our own doubts and darkness, our own faults and failures, we often cannot believe that God's love includes and enfolds us too. It is a gift of self-reflection, honesty, and truth to be able to perceive and confess where we fall short. Indeed, I believe that this spiritual self-knowledge and self-awareness endears us even more to our Lord Jesus, who urged his followers to perceive the log in their own eye before noticing the specks in the eyes of the other human beings upon whom they all too eagerly cast a critical gaze.

In the coming Holy Week as we walk with Jesus, let us remember that only God is perfect. Jesus doesn't want or expect us to be perfect. Jesus wants us to be faithful, to try on new and healing ways of being in the world, to take risks for the sake of the Kingdom of God, and to always remember to whom we belong. Jesus wants us to love God with all our heart and soul and mind, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. It sounds so simple. It is certainly straightforward. However, the truth is that each of us knows how hard this is to do day in, day out. We can only strive to attain this level of faith and love by relying not on our own power but on God's mighty, mysterious, and miraculous mercy and grace.

In the coming Holy Week, when we remember the darkness of the cruelty and violence, the suffering and sorrow, which Jesus endured to liberate our hearts and spirits and to redeem our lives, we are called to look for the light, to be the light, to shine the light of Christ in a weary and broken world struggling with fearful and devastating illnesses, wars, climate change and environmental degradation, injustice and oppression, hunger and poverty, death and grief. We can do this because we worship a God who not only strengthens us for the journey, but also walks with us every step of the way. The God of peace is with us! Emmanuel is revealed in the week of Jesus' Passion in the most extraordinary, humble, tender, and loving ways imaginable. I pray that we pay very close attention to listening for our God who is still speaking and who is ever present, urging us forward along His Way of Love.....today, tomorrow, and always!

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Wardens Corner

Last fall you heard a sermon and several talks from parishioners on stewardship. As was emphasized, stewardship is not one-dimensional, as sometimes assumed. Rather, it calls for the giving of time and talent as well as financial resources, and it is a year-round endeavor. Stewardship is unquestionably growing at St. Andrew's.

As you may have noticed, more and more parishioners are helping make services go smoothly. We have a deeper bench serving as chalcists (you no longer have to endure me in that role every Sunday), and there are more ushers, readers, greeters and Altar Guild members as well.

Many others are offering their time and talent on the Parish Life Committee, which has sprung to life as the threat of Covid has receded. The Committee is in the final stages of preparations for a Sunday brunch to bring us together and bid farewell to Henry Swan (a sad turn of events, but mitigated by Henry's promise to rejoin us when he is in town). Initial plans for a spring dinner are underway, and the Committee intends to eventually announce the traditional summer evening gathering, which Rhea Brooks has kindly offered to host. Discussions are also underway to bring back a version of the highly successful St. Andrew's "Wild and Crazy Auction" and for another Sunday brunch in the fall. The regular Sunday coffee hours are a backdrop to all of this. More hosts are needed for the coffee hours, and the Committee always welcomes helping hands for its other events which energize our community life.

Parish outreach is a significant measure of our stewardship. The Love our Neighbor project, which St. Andrew's launched with the United Congregational Church, has identified several needy members of the community and provided them with financial aid in recent months. St. Andrew's parishioners have been volunteering to serve lunches to seniors at the Little Compton Community Center, and we have recently resumed weekly and voluminous donations to the food banks in Little Compton and Westport. Plans to collect and donate used clothing are underway. Also, on behalf of the parish, the Outreach Committee has made donations to the summer camp for children at the Episcopal Conference Center, the Westport Council on Aging, and Dorcas International, an immigrant relief organization, among other worthy charitable organizations.

Finally, the financial component of stewardship at St. Andrew's has been encouraging too. To date, the parish has received 51 pledges for \$217,500, exceeding our 2023 goal of \$210,000.

I'd be remiss if this mention of all the activity at St. Andrew's didn't also emphasize the upcoming Spring Awakening Walk in God's Creation at Dundrey Brook from 10 to noon and the Coffee House evening of Christian music with singer Ray Tierney in the parish hall from 7 until 9 PM, both events on April 1. I also highly recommend the Lenten Bible Studies on Wednesdays from 5:30 until 7 PM, led by Rev. Virginia Army and Rev. Rebecca Marshall.

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Treasurer's Report

The March Treasurer's Report to the Vestry (reporting parish January and February financials) was provided on March 9th.

On the income side, receipts during the first two months of the year significantly exceeded the budget (\$58,115 vs. \$35,730). Note that there is much year-to-year variation in pledge and gift receipts, and things always even out over the year. Expenses were a bit over budget (\$39,536 vs. \$35,957) due to completing some much overdue tree trimming. We continue to have enough cash in the bank to cover several months of operating expenses. Our investments were up nicely in January but down a bit in February, so year-to-date, we are up 3.5%.

The 2023 stewardship mission had a goal of \$210,000, and I am happy to report that we received two more pledges. We now have a pledge commitment of \$217,500 with 51 pledges. February is always a big month for financial-related activity. First was the Annual Meeting, where I reported on last year's financial wrap-up and presented the 2023 operating budget for approval. The balanced budget was approved at \$228,190 for income and expenses. The Diocese requires that the Parochial Report and several financial documents and forms be submitted by March 1st. These were all submitted and approved by the Diocese.

I want to express my thanks to all of you for your generous support. For the past 109 years, St. Andrew's has always come together to meet the challenge, and you are upholding the tradition!

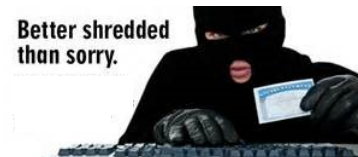

Condiments: ketchup, mayonnaise, mustard, salad dressing, salt & pepper

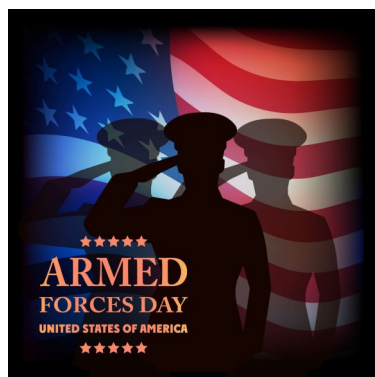
